Going Nuclear to Retain Power

The **filibuster** is a long-held Senate procedure that fosters debate on legislation. Currently, 60 votes are needed to end debate and hold a final vote on a bill.

In a January 3 letter to colleagues, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer laid out his plan to "nuke the filibuster" (change to only 51 votes needed to end debate) and then pass a partisan bill to put Washington bureaucrats in charge of our election laws.



Going Nuclear to blow-up the filibuster is a sign of political desperation. Majority Leader Schumer hasn't been willing to go down this road on any other policy fight. He's only doing so now to save himself and retain power after November 2022.

Schumer has filibustered many times, and used to publicly support it:



In 2005, Schumer described the filibuster as the "hallmark of the Senate," as "the guard rail of our democracy." He denounced any attempt to undermine extended debate as a "power grab" that would destroy the "checks and balances that are at the core of our Constitution and our Republic."



As recently as 2016, Schumer was filibustering and tweeting in defense of its use.

A Bill to Rig our Election Laws (S. 2747)

Majorities come and go, so normally, the party in the majority has defended the filibuster so they could use it whenever they ended up back in the minority. In fact, a Republican Senate majority protected the filibuster in 2017.

But by federalizing election law, and rigging the rules in his favor, Schumer thinks he can maintain his majority forever.

Here's what's in Schumer's so-called "Freedom to Vote Act" (S. 2747):

Publicly funds political campaigns by allowing states to opt-in to the federal financing of House races

Undermines state voter ID laws

Mandates same-day registration

Requires ballots cast outside the voter's precinct to be counted

Creates unaccountable redistricting committees

Unconstitutionally requires states to restore the ability of felons to vote

Requires political nonprofits to disclose donors

The Truth About Voting in America


Democrats act as if large swaths of America are being denied the right to vote. The facts tell a different story:



In 2020, **67% of all citizens age 18 and older** reported voting, up 5 percentage points from 2016.



In addition, **73% of all voting-age citizens** were registered to vote, 2 percentage points higher than in 2016.
