As we engage this legislative week, there are several areas of legislation on which Heritage Action will focus.

- **Border Security and Wall** funding remains a priority in any end of year funding legislation. <u>Recent polling</u> shows that voters agree with President Trump's views on the border, and the DHS funding bill should <u>fully fund the President's request for the border</u> <u>wall</u>. Republicans should not agree to funding for the seven remaining bills without providing border wall funding.
- In anticipation of the Farm Bill conference report being considered this week, <u>92 percent</u> of <u>Americans agree</u> that able-bodied adults who receive cash, food, housing, and medical assistance should be required to work or prepare for work. It is better that Republicans pass a one-year extension if the conference report does not strengthen work requirements for food stamp recipients.
- Congress should use **end of year tax legislation** to make necessary technical corrections and to advance other good tax policies. However, provisions that <u>provide</u> <u>preferential tax treatment</u> to particular industries do not make the tax code simpler and fairer, and should not be included. By contrast, the Committee on Ways and Means is working on a bill that accomplishes these goals, and House Republicans should support their effort.

While there are <u>other issues</u> that could move in this lame duck, <u>Temporary Assistance for</u> <u>Needy Families</u> is one additional legislative item that we are watching closely. **TANF reauthorization** should encourage recipients to engage in work.
